Robbie Gray, assisted by Bob Ridle, gave a brief history of the Glidden Tour. The original Glidden Tours, held from 1902 through 1913 were named after Charles J. Glidden, an early auto enthusiast and financier. He presented the AAA (American Automobile Association) with a trophy for the winner of the 1905 competition. The Glidden Revival Tours were started in 1946 and continue to the present day, sponsored by on alternate years by VMCCA (Veteran Motor Car Club of America) and AACA.

Our Region hosted the Glidden Tour in 1999 and several of our members regularly participate in the annual tour. Billy Melton has attended 39 Glidden Tours and Ronnie Shanholtzer has attended 38.



Do you speak HPOF?

In 1987 AACA established an exhibition class called HPOF (Historic Preservation of Original Features) to encourage owners to save and display collector vehicles in their original and unrestored, as manufactured condition. Until recently, this class was fairly obscure and usually relegated to the far side of the show field where few spectators got to view the vehicles. Recently there seems to be more interest in these "time capsules". It has been reported that at 2024 Eastern Meet at Hershey, Over 191 of the nearly 1400 vehicles entered were in the HPOF class. Many of the collector car publications are now featuring unrestored cars in contrast to their usual fare of highly restored vehicles.

Certification as an HPOF a vehicle requires that it must be at least 25 years old, and retain significant features in original unrestored condition. A vehicle may be entirely original or it may have certain original features such as paint, chassis, upholstery, engine compartment, etc., that are essentially as delivered from the factory. These vehicles are not point judged but are certified to have an average of at least 65% of their original features of exterior, interior, chassis and engine. Once a vehicle is certified it is awarded a badge for the front of the vehicle and the owner is presented with an exhibition award and a board to display the initial and subsequent awards. Once a vehicle is certified as HPOF, it can be evaluated at a subsequent National meet in order to receive the AACA "Original". This award requires fewer non-compliant features on the vehicle than the HPOF award.

In many cases, all of the published manuals, sales brochures and other literature available will not provide the level of detail available by examining an original car as delivered from the factory. How many times have we said to ourselves, "if only I could look at an original car to see how this part looked"? It is not uncommon to have a vehicle that has undergone several restorations over its life and few traces of how it originally looked remain. This is why we need to save the HPOF vehicles.

As an owner, why would you want to keep your car in unrestored condition? I can tell you from my own experience that it is really special to have such a car. First, the expense of maintaining the HPOF vehicle is very low. You drive it, show it, enjoy it and only repair it if it breaks. The parking lot dings, the primer showing through the rubbed out paint and the occasional paint chipped off the air cleaner are just a testimony to the vehicle's originality. You won't see HPOF cars roped off from spectators or displaying "Don't Touch" signs. People seem to relate more to the unrestored vehicles since they are more representative of the cars we grew up with that were far from perfect. If you are lucky enough to find a low-mileage, original vehicle you can spend hours on end at shows telling spectators the story of your HPOF vehicle. Next time you are at a meet, check out the HPOF class and I think you will agree with me, these vehicles are special!


