

If you haven't visited our newly designed club and Library websites recently, I encourage you to do so.



If you read Fred Trusty's article that we published last month, you heard Fred's analysis on EVs. Based on his experience with the 2010 Nissan Leaf, purchase of an EV did not make financial sense.

In response to that article, I received the following from our friend Dean Tryon who has had much more favorable experiences with EVs.

Dean's response:

His experience with the 2010 Leaf is similar to that of a friend here. This is one of the first all electric cars offered with very old technology. She got rid of it for loss of range. This is not typical of newer EV's though.



My 2018 Chev Volt at 42,000 mi and a friend's 2018 Volt at 75,000 mi had minimal loss of range.

Batteries generally do not need to be replaced at 100,000 mi.- the factory warranty will replace it if the range has reduced to a predetermined value. In Calif. it is 150,000 mi. if the range is 65% of new. Many sources believe battery life is in the 200,000 range or more. EV batteries do not go into the dump when pulled out of an EV - they can be disassembled and individual cells used for less critical non-EV applications.

The leaf had minimal range to start with. All new EV's have at least 260 mi range and most are over 300mi. They do have reduced range in cold weather but so do gas cars. EV's might be a bit more severe though.

One big issue with EV batteries is the use of lithium (Li) but this does not appear to be the long term battery solution. Many companies have developed other types with more range and faster recharge times.
