FORD DRIVERS AND OWNERS

The Filicky Starter is composed of a system of planetary gears housed in the hub of the steering wheel, which are fixed to a sectional hard steel shaft extending down and thru the dash and differentiating by means of bronze

knuckles to a small beveled gear, which in turn meshes with a larger bronze gear fixed to the main shaft of motor.

The Filicky Starter is simplicity itself in operation and the driver NEED NEVER LEAVE THE SEAT to start even a refractory motor.

It is operated from the driver's seat by pulling out a spring button, releasing the steering wheel, which is then pulled up to the starting position. The wheel in this position is now connected directly with the main shaft of motor. To start the motor the wheel is now revolved to the left with the driver's foot on the choke or primer; a part of the standard Filicky Starter equipment.

After the motor is started, the wheel is now dropped back into place, automatically releasing the starting gears, which then become inactive after the motor "turns over."

There are no moving parts of the Filicky Starter after the motor is in operation. For this reason it WILL LAST FOR THE LIFE OF THE CAR, as there are NO PARTS TO WEAR OUT.

A cold motor can be started with two complete turns of the steering wheel (four compressions); a warm motor with a half turn (two compressions).

With the Filicky Starter the motor may be "spun" or merely "turned over" at the discretion of the driver. It is easy of operation and is based on a gear ratio of two to one.

Members check out the O'Neil's menu. The food was delicious!






Founders' Day Award

President Jack presents Scott Gregory a Jefferson Cup recognizing him as the past year's winner.




Scott then surprised Jack by announcing that Jack Drago is the Founders' Day Award winner for 2018

Another time Dad was on his way to work and the T was running rather poorly. He pulled both the spark and gas levers down and proceeded to join the infamous two-piece crankshaft club. I don't remember what happened to the car after that episode.

Dad did go on to buy the second 1928 Model A Roadster to come to Churchville, but there are also stories of this car I can recall. Strange I can remember these cars but I can't remember what I did yesterday.
