Scott Gregory did his usual fine job of selling 50/50 tickets.




President Drago and V.P. Wilson greeted our guest speaker from VDOT.

I had him check his mirrors and also check for any other cars coming down the road.

Jack proceeded down the road shifting from 1<sup>st</sup> to 2<sup>nd</sup> to 3<sup>rd</sup>. I told him to get ready to stop down the road at a mailbox. 


#### Admission


