# Notes from your Editor

Since our April meeting was cancelled, there are no minutes for the meeting.

### "Simple" Maintenance Project

One of the benefits of being forced to stay at home is feeling compelled to tackle some of the old car projects that you have been putting off. In my world, some of these tasks seem to become much more complex than I expected in the beginning. Over the past couple of weeks, I decided it might be time to check out my '49 Buick in preparation for the upcoming Sentimental Tour in West Virginia (now cancelled). I put the car on the hoist and checked the tires, looking at date codes that quickly reminded me that the tires although looking new, were clearly due for replacement before doing any serious touring. I checked the car logbook and confirmed that these radials were installed in 2006 and would require replacement. Sounds straight forward. Order the tires and get them mounted and put them back on the car. Now, reality sets in.

I ordered the Coker radials online and they arrived in about a week.

I pulled the four wheels and decided to clean them up before having the new tires mounted and balanced. Guess what, the left front tire showed evidence of a brake fluid leak that had not been evident before, so that would need attention.

I ordered a new wheel cylinder from Rock Auto, figuring it would fix the problem. I then decided to pull the brake drum and have the system cleaned up when the new part arrived. The brake drum refused to come off. Tried all the normal steps, WD-40, Kroil, heat with a torch, and "gentle" taps with large hammers. OK, maybe things will work better tomorrow.

The next day arrives and I decide to use the last resort: look in the shop manual. Did you know that on these vintage Buicks the drums are riveted to the hubs and the hub comes off with the drum? After looking at the logbook, I found that I had rebuilt brakes on this car in 1994, right after we drove it home to Michigan from Wisconsin. (another story). Somehow, after 26 years I didn't remember the little details of removing front drums. After following the manual, the drum came off easily, revealing the faulty wheel cylinder. The brake shoes showed some wear so I decided to check the other 3 drums.

Fast forward to the next day when I pull the remaining drums, locating another wheel cylinder that has some weeping fluid as well as brake shoes that show some wear after 26 years and 20,000 miles. Back to Rock Auto to order 3 more wheel cylinders and 4 sets of brake shoes. In the process, I'll replace the DOT 3 brake fluid that is due for change.

I'm sure the rest of this simple repair will go much more smoothly??? I'll give you an update next month if the project is completed by then.


### Remember?
